





ADA Policy Statement

Policy 604.0: Policy on Non-Discrimination Adopted January 22, 2014:

"It is CDOT's policy that no person shall on the ground of race, color, national origin, sex, disability, or age, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination in any operation of CDOT or of any department or agency to which CDOT extends federal financial assistance."

Public entities are required by Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act to provide accessible services to persons with disabilities. For CDOT, "accessible services" means things like curb ramps, rest stops, building facilities, and public information.



28 CFR Part 35.

§ 35.101 Purpose and broad coverage.


(a) Purpose. The purpose of this part is to implement subtitle A of title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 12131-12134), as amended by the ADA Amendments Act of 2008 (ADA Amendments Act) (Pub. L. 110-325, 122 Stat. 3553 (2008)), which prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability by public entities.

(b) Broad coverage. The primary purpose of the ADA Amendments Act is to make it easier for people with disabilities to obtain protection under the ADA. Consistent with the ADA Amendments Act's purpose of reinstating a broad scope of protection under the ADA, the definition of "disability" in this part shall be construed broadly in favor of expansive coverage to the maximum extent permitted by the terms of the ADA. The primary object of attention in cases brought under the ADA should be whether entities covered under the ADA have complied with their obligations and whether discrimination has occurred, not whether the individual meets the definition of "disability." The question of whether an individual meets the definition of "disability."



Through CDOT's Accessibility Program, CDOT has prioritized six of the Accessibility Guidelines for Pedestrian Facilities in the Public Right-of-Way (PROWAG) criteria to determine ADA functional compliance of curb ramps. These six criteria assist CDOT in prioritizing curb ramps to be addressed and were adopted following public involvement sessions in 2017.

- Running slope of 8.3% or less
- Cross slope of 2% (or equal to street or highway grade without Stop or Yield control)
- Curb ramp width of 48" or greater
- Curb ramp joints and grade breaks are flush
- Turning space area of 48" x 48" (48" x 60" for Type 2C curb ramps)
- Clear space requirement of 48" x 48" wholly outside of active traffic lanes for diagonal curb ramps

Curb Ramps


- 20,101 existing curb ramps
- Each with approximately 20-40 data points/fields
- 1,537 locations where ramps to not exist (but should)
- 21,638 total areas to be evaluated to determine if improvements/upgrades are required

Pedestrian Push Buttons


- 14,406 were inventoried




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Curb Ramp Program

2022 ADA Transition Plan Update





- CDOT last completed a full update of the ADA Transition Plan in 2017 and, as the plan is a living document, a routine update is needed with a robust public involvement process.
- CDOT's vision is to consider accessibility features in the design and construction of all projects with a focus on implementing compliance, continuity, and consistency while using taxpayer dollars wisely and judiciously.

- Approximately 170 ramps on Colorado Boulevard.
- Approximately 80 ramps on Kipling Street, 6th Avenue, Parker Road, and Havana Street.
- Region 1 also continues to deliver over 500 ADA curb ramps via a Construction Manager/General Contractor (CM/GC) method.



- Curb Ramps on Hampden Avenue/US 285 and Colorado Boulevard.
- The project currently includes just over 200 ramps.





- US 160 in Walsenburg, ramps were installed at 23 intersections on US 160/7th St. and CO 10/5th St.
- Woodland Park along Colorado 67 from US 24 to Lucky Lady Dr.
- SH 67 Corridor.
- Various locations along Colorado Highway (CO) 45, CO 47, CO 96, and CO 78 throughout Pueblo .



- US 285 and SH 9 Project this will do the ramps in Alma and Fairplay.
- La Veta.
- El Paso County.
- Woodland Park SH 24 Corridor.





- Leadville (over 100 ramps).
 - Built in a historic district (upwards of 28 variances needed).
- The US 40 ADA upgrades in Grand and Jackson Counties (2020).
- Garfield County ADA improvements (2020).



• Eagle ADA Project: includes communities of Vail, Avon, Edwards, Eagle, and Gypsum





Recent Major ADA Curb Ramp Projects Completed:

- Fort Collins: Various locations along CO 14, US 287, and the Prospect Rest Area off I-25.
- US 34: Akron, Otis, Yuma & Wray.
- Limon residency ADA project addressed all ramps in the southeastern counties of R4.
- Longmont: Various locations on US 287, CO 66 & CO 119.
- Boulder: Various locations on SH 7, SH 93, SH 119, SH 157, and US 36.
- Greeley: US 34 & Hwy 85.



- Fort Lupton: SH 52 project.
- A region project to inspect all ramps within R4. (This project will help CDOT identify upcoming ramp projects).





- US 50 & SH 291 in Salida.
- SH 142 in Manassa.
- Smaller projects in Durango, Cortez, and Rico.



- US 160 in Monte Vista and Alamosa.
- SH 149 in Creede.
- US 160 in Mancos.

Bustang





- A majority of Bustang, Snowstang, Outrider, and Pegasus use existing bus stops.
- When projects are developed, accessibility is taken into consideration within the project's boundaries for curb ramps and sidewalks.



- 14 Mobility Hub locations have been identified to either improve or build new park and ride structures. These projects will contain ADA improvements.
- A comprehensive audit of the 86 Outrider stops is underway and is anticipated to be completed in winter 2022. The design for some locations is already underway with a goal of having construction completed by the end of 2024.



Property Management (CDOT Office Buildings and Rest Areas)



Recent Major ADA Projects Completed:

- Transportation Commission requested a Rest Area Study. Approved in 2018 with \$6M added to Asset Management pool for fiscal year 2023.
- Yearly ADA audits on all rest areas and CDOT buildings.



Upcoming ADA Projects:

- Vail Pass Rest Area improvements: construction scheduled to start late July/early August.
- Statewide critical repairs, safety enhancements and ADA compliance.
- Bair Ranch, No Name, and Grizzly Creek in Glenwood Canyon.
- Shaw Creek near South Fork.
- El Moro near Trinidad.
- Elk Springs between Dinosaur and Craig.



Online Content

House Bill 21-1110

In July 2021, Colorado passed HB 21-1110, which requires state and local government entities to comply with the Governor's Office of Information Technology (OIT) Accessibility Technical Standards by July 1, 2024. Under the law, all Colorado state agencies must be compliant when creating and publishing any online content and materials; or must provide reasonable accommodations for people with disabilities.

- Any person who believes that they have been the subject of disability-related discrimination or who is filing on behalf of a person with a disability may use the CDOT Discrimination Complaint Form (available on CDOT's website) or email the CRBRC at <u>dot_civilrights@state.co.us.</u>
- Relevant information should be provided within the complaint (requirements can be found on website).
- Investigation Process.
- Record Retention (5 years).


