What's an ADA Compliance Transition Plan?

An ADA Transition Plan is a required document that assesses and outlines solutions for functional accessibility across CDOT's projects and programs. It is a living resource that is periodically updated.

What's in the Transition Plan?

Section 1: Transition Plan Requirements and Complaint Procedure

Section 2: Evaluation of Policies, Practices, and Facilities

Section 3: Statewide Curb Ramp Inventory Section 4: Curb Ramp Improvement Program

This Plan is an update to the 2013 ADA Transition Plan, which outlined our methodology for a statewide curb ramp inventory, and a team of CDOT staff members have been performing that inventory since summer of 2013. The inventory resulted in 20,101 curb ramps, 23% of which are compliant with Public Right of Way Accessibility Guidelines (PROWAG).

Section 4 of the current Plan outlines CDOT's approach to addressing deficiencies over the next five years.

What Will I See in My Neighborhood?

Each CDOT Regional Office has a different approach to fixing and installing curb ramps, so different communities will see changes at different times. Residents of Denver, Durango, and Dolores will see improvements beginning this summer, and other areas will be kept informed of progress.

What if I Need a Curb Ramp Installed?

CDOT has a request form that you can complete to request installation of a curb ramp. CDOT doesn't oversee every intersection in the state, but we will work with local agencies to address every request.
