**Colorado Hookless Cactus
(Sclerocactus glaucus)**

Federal status: Threatened
Colorado status: Not listed

This is a small ball or barrel-shaped cactus usually with straight (i.e., hookless) central spines, solitary, ovoid to nearly globular. Stems are 1.5 to 7 inches tall with generally pinkish flowers. Flowering occurs from April to May.

Habitat: This species is generally found on coarse soils derived from cobble and gravel river and stream terrace deposits, or rocky surfaces on mesa slopes at 4,400 to 6,200 feet in elevation. It is found in 4 western Colorado counties: Delta, Garfield, Mesa and Montrose.
