



Scentless Chamomile  
*Matricaria perforata*



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The Colorado Noxious Weed Act requires every landowner to **eradicate, contain or suppress this weed** wherever it is found on his or her property. The Colorado Department of Transportation controls these weeds on its right-of-way.

Scentless chamomile is an annual, biennial, or short-lived perennial forb that grows 6 inches to 3 feet tall. The daisy-like flowers are white, 0.75 inches and are solitary on each stem. Flowers have a yellow central disk surrounded by white petals. Leaves are fern-like, finely divided, and odorless when crushed. The stems can have numerous branches.

Frequent, shallow tillage can help exhaust the seed bank in non-native areas. Mowing is not an effective long-term control method. More details about this species and controlling it are available online at <http://www.colorado.gov/ag/weeds>.

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
