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## Wild Caraway

(*Carum carvi*)

The Colorado Noxious Weed Act requires every landowner to **eradicate, contain or suppress this weed** wherever it is found on his or her property. The Colorado Department of Transportation controls these weeds on its right-of-way.

Wild caraway is a biennial or sometimes perennial forb. Stem leaves are finely divided, and resemble those of carrots in shape but tend to droop more. Shoot leaves are alternate and normally oblong or oval. The small flowers are white or pinkish. They occur in clusters at the top of stems.

Collected seed should be disposed of in landfill-bound garbage or thoroughly burned. This plant's response to repeated mowing is to stay short (below mowing height) and bloom. More details about this species and controlling it are available online at <http://www.colorado.gov/ag/weeds>.

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
