



### Migratory Bird Treaty Act

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Since 1918, the Migratory Bird Treaty Act (MBTA) has made it unlawful “to hunt, take, capture, kill, [or] possess” any bird protected by the Act. The Act protects not only the birds themselves but also any “part, nest, or egg of such bird.”

Under the MBTA almost all birds are protected, including common species such as swallows, crows and geese. To comply with the Act, CDOT’s construction and maintenance activities need to avoid disturbance of active nests.
