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Recognizing the importance of the black-tailed prairie dog (*Cynomys ludovicianus*) as a “keystone” species, upon which other species depend for prey, CDOT has adopted a formal policy regarding how to address colonies of this species that are affected by State Highway projects. Impacts to prairie dog colonies are to be avoided and minimized if possible.

If impacts are unavoidable, populations from colonies of two or more acres shall be relocated, if possible. Prairie dogs from smaller colonies will be captured and provided to raptor rehabilitation facilities or provided to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to support reintroduction of the black-footed ferret.
