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This heaviest member of the weasel family (20 to 30 pounds or more) grows to three feet long, with a rather short tail, just one-quarter the total length. They are stocky mammals, built like a small bear. Their fur is dark brown to black, and the sides have a characteristic yellowish brown to whitish stripe. Like other weasels, wolverine have musk-producing glands.

Habitat: Historically, wolverines were found in higher elevation, alpine areas of Colorado. Until recently, the last confirmed wolverine sighting in the state was in 1919. However, in 2009, researchers tracked a wolverine that traveled 500 miles from Wyoming's Grand Teton National Park into north central Colorado. This was the first confirmed sighting in the state in 90 years.

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
