



This fish is a slender minnow with a small mouth, slightly overhung by snout. Its dorsal fin is slightly rounded with 8 rays. As the common name suggests, this minnow is generally brassy in color. It is yellow-olive on the back with a green-gold stripe on the sides and a silver-white belly. Adults average 2.5 to 3.0 inches in length.
