

Project Background



What is the Mountain Rail Project?

The Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) is exploring a new initiative to enhance transportation options in the central Rocky Mountains.

The plan involves developing a rail line that connects the mountain towns and regions with urban centers and recreational locations.

This project aims to use existing rail infrastructure to meet the growing demand for passenger rail service.



Funding Opportunities

Two key funding sources for Mountain Rail, approved in last legislative session, to begin collecting in the next 18 months:

- 1. SB24-184 Support Surface Transportation Infrastructure Development
 - Daily fee applied to rental cars
 - Funding goes to Colorado Transportation Investment office (CTIO) applicable to transit, congestion reduction
 - Begins January 2025
- 2. SB24-230 Oil & Gas Production Fees
 - Fee on the production of oil and gas
 - Funding goes to Clean Transit Enterprise (CTE) applicable to clean transit
 - Begins Jan 2026

CDOT & State Officials are working closely to allocate funds from fees collected towards Mountain Rail and other eligible projects

CDOT is exploring Federal grants & financing programs to amplify state funds

Enhance passenger rail connectivity between Denver and Craig

Connect diverse communities with unique needs



Foster economic vitality through improved transportation equity and a Just Transition away from fossil fuels

Project Benefits



Mountain Rail provides a better transportation option for our environment and economy.

Creating alternative transportation will help Colorado meet its greenhouse gas reduction goals to ensure we have cleaner air and environment, while also supporting local mountain economies along the corridor.

Why is Mountain Rail good for Colorado?

This rail corridor will provide congestion free, safe and reliable service to mountain towns, recreational opportunities, and Just Transition communities to spur economic development within these communities and throughout Colorado. The corridor may also provide the local workforce with more transit options to get to and from work.



Why is Mountain Rail planning to use freight tracks?

Mountain Rail will utilize existing freight tracks to provide passenger service, this allows for service to be operational in the near term and costs less than building an entirely new rail line.



What is a Service Development Plan (SDP)?

- Determines operational and financial feasibility
- Defines all essential elements of planning and operations
- Includes an alternatives analysis
- Leverages industry best practices, including FRA's planning process
- Streamlines the subsequent permitting process

Equity


- Opportunity to support Just Transition
