The test simulates a vehicle traveling at 30 mph crashing into the side of a small passenger vehicle traveling at 15 mph.

National SafeKids: Policies and Procedures Manual (ver. 1/21/2014) - Updated to include "strongly" recommend 5:1 student to instructor ratio, this includes the course checkup event.

WASHINGTON - The U.S. Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic

Safety Administration (NHTSA) today proposed upgrades to the federal motor vehicle safety standard for child-restraint systems to ensure child passengers are protected in side crashes. The proposed upgrades would include a first-ever side impact test for car seats sold in the U.S. that are designed for children weighing up to 40 pounds.

The proposed test would include the currently available 12 mo child crash test dummy and the newly designed 3 yo crash test dummy with biometrics for side impact analysis. (please see December 2013 CPS Newsletter for biometrics information).

For clarification, with the new Diono convertible line/booster seats (Ranier, Pacifica and Olympia), the Safe Stop is to be used for ALL forward facing installations with children who weigh 20-40 pounds. This is a change from their current seats, and is not applicable to the Radian, only the new seats coming out first quarter 2014.

Steps to CPST Recertification:

Recertification Requirements

CPS certification expires after two years. Technicians and Instructors are required to successfully complete the recertification process before their current certification expires.

Scott and his team will receive a Child Restraint manufacturers' Instruction with summary sheets DVD from SafetyBeltSafe U.S.A. provided by the Colorado CPS program.

Here is what you need to do to recertify:

Meet these requirements and record the activities in your online profile.

- * Conduct all five different types of seat checks.
- * Participate in at least one community event (one checkup or community workshop).
- * Participate in at least six continuing education units (CEUs). As part of ongoing quality assurance, you may be randomly selected for a CEU audit. Keep proof of

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- content and completion of CEUS nanay for three months after you recertify.
- * You can monitor your audit status in your online profile. If you are an instructor, complete 20 Certification/Certification Renewal Course teaching hours.
- * Pay the recertification fee. The recertification fee is \$50 for technicians and instructor candidates and \$60 for instructors.

Check your online profile if you are not sure when your certification expires.

You must complete all recertification requirements, including paying the recertification fee, on or before the expiration date of your current certification.

Seat Checks for Recertification: Real or Mock?

can use a mock, or fake, scenario. Be sure to talk so there are clear expectations before the seat check.

The following guidelines were approved by the Certification/Recertification committee of the National CPS Board:

- * During a seat check, it is always best to have the child present.
- * Instructors and technicians are strongly encouraged to make every effort to do an actual

safety seat checkup.

* If an actual caregiver is not available, the instructor/technician proxy may choose a mock

scenario, where a colleague acts out the part of the parent.

* It is strongly encouraged that you enter your seat checks throughout your certification

cycle, rather than waiting until near your certification expiration date.

Real or mock, an actual vehicle must always be used for seat checks.

Be sure to work on your recertification requirements during your certification cycle and

don't wait until the end. Seat checks for recertification must be approved online by the

instructor or tech proxy. They will receive an automatic notification email but please do email or

call them if you are in a time crunch.

New Study Finds 66 Children a Day Treated in U.S. Emergency Departments for Shopping Cart-Related Injuries.

Infant seats in shopping carts, using car seats outside of the vehicle. Manufacturer recommendations:

"Avoid placing infant carriers on top of shopping carts. If your child is not old

enough to sit upright by himself in the shopping cart seat, consider other options such as leaving your child at home with another adult while you are at the store, using in-store child care areas, using a front- or back-pack carrier, or using a stroller."

This may not work for every parent, sometimes the infant carrier may be placed in the basket portion of the cart with the child appropriately restrained in the seat at all times. As always the role of a CPS Technician is to provide the best education we can and let the caregiver make the final decisions. Problem solve with the caregiver during the educational car seat check session to help them understand the risks.

NEW CDC STUDY: Restraint Use and Motor Vehicle Occupant Death Rates Among Children Aged 0-12

Fewer U.S. children are dying in car crashes, with death rates falling by 43 percent from 2002 to 2011, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said on Tuesday.

But one in three of the children who died in a car crash in 2011 was not using a seat belt or child safety seat, suggesting many more deaths could be prevented, the CDC said. The results were based on a study in the Morbidity and Mortality report, the agency's weekly report on death and disease.

Speed, Seat Belts and Impaired Driving Cause Most Fatalities on Colorado Roads

Grant Funding Now Available for Colorado Highway Safety Issues

STATEWIDE-In 2012, the total number of motor vehicle fatalities in Colorado increased for the first time in six years after a steady decline. Speed-related fatalities, fatalities with a driver impaired by alcohol, and unbuckled occupant vehicles fatalities accounted for the three largest proportions of motor vehicle deaths in Colorado. Of 472 motor vehicle deaths in 2012, 162 (34%) were speed-related and an estimated 133 (28%) involved a driver impaired by alcohol. Of major concern is that of the 287 passenger vehicle fatalities, 156 (54%) were unbuckled.

To combat these and other traffic safety issues, the Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) Office of Transportation Safety offers grant funds through the Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century Act (MAP-21) to agencies, organizations and tribal governments within the State of Colorado that provide programs, projects, services and strategies that are intended to reduce the number of deaths and serious injuries resulting from traffic crashes on Colorado roadways.

"Focusing prevention efforts related to speed, impaired driving and seat belt use provide the greatest opportunity to impact the total number of fatalities on Colorado roadways," said Darrell Lingk, Director of the Office of Transportation Safety at CDOT. "But there are many other traffic safety issues that also need attention, such as pedestrian safety and impaired driving involving marijuana. It's through our local communities that we move the needle in terms of decreasing motor vehicle fatalities and serious injury crashes."

The total projected funding available is \$3.5 million and the average award amount typically ranges from \$50,000-\$75,000 The Request For Application (RFA) process kicks off during a webinar on Monday, Feb. 3 from 1:00-3:00 p.m., which covers the 2014 Problem Identification Report and the FY15 grant funding process.
