#### NHTSA (National Highway Traffic Safety Administration) Region 8 Update:

- Tuesday Black, CDOT (reading information given)
  - DWI court training and technical assistance, this is information that was provided to me by Ross Washburn. Please know I don't have any further answers. If there's questions that come up.
  - DWI court training and technical assistance, the current agreement ends on March 23rd with a new agreement waving approval. This means no new training for future Judicial fellows and outreach liaison programs. The judicial fellows, the Judicial outreach liaison, the stop work order, has been lifted. The current agreement remains in effect until the end of September; our mid-year meeting was held at the end of January and was held in Arizona. To be held at Lifesavers, was cancelled. I think that they were trying to put together like a virtual meeting before Lifesavers. Not sure if it ended up taking place.
  - Judicial education national Judicial College is hosting a drug impaired driving essentials class in Indianapolis in March and Operation Safe arrival for military and civilian judges in San Antonio in April. This agreement ends at the end of September. And the stop work order was lifted, so training and conferences participation continues.

#### Statistics, State Fatality Numbers:

- Tuesday Black, CDOT
  - This time last year we had 105 fatalities and 68. Fatalities are decreasing.
- Discussion by Group on Denver County Court first DUI scooter.
- Ian Danielson, CDPHE for Reagan
  - We're hovering about 27%. Suspected impaired for fatal crashes, which is relatively typical for this type of year. It's a 6% decrease since this time last year.
  - The top counties with the highest percentage of suspected impaired are Larimer, Adams, Douglas and Jefferson, in that order.
  - Driving crashes peak in the 21 to 24 age group.
- Continued Group Discussion continues related to Scooter DUI
- Dwayne Liller for Rachel Reinhardt, CSP
  - January through February comparison 2024 to 2025
  - Percent of CSP fatal crashes that were impaired, 2024 that number was about 38% of all fatal crashes were impaired in 2025. Been about 27% of fatal crashes were impaired. CSP does have one more fatal crash total this year than last year, but the percentage of those fatal crashes decreased compared to this time last year. There is a map that shows where they are on our CSP crash map that's available in our strategic communications page.

#### Legislative Updates:

- Rebecca Green, MADD
  - Defeated Bar Hours Bill 1237, able to get a broad coalition of over 42. Law enforcement organizations, safety advocates, victims and survivors, public health groups, crime victim organizations, Denver bars and restaurants to join us.

  - The express consent campaign
    - In charge of designing a campaign to raise awareness about the express consent law we've got.
  - On Patrick's Day we tend to see a spike in DUI, so we're going to be at the parade giving out ride share credits.
  - Between now and the end of April, beginning May is when we do a lot of outreaches around cannabis, impair driving, especially with 420 coming.
  - We are going to launch really my biggest pay media buy of all my campaigns involved cannabis that will be up in the next few weeks. It'll be a \$500,000 media buy Involving the dangers of cannabis and driving the focus of the campaign is called meet the consequences.
