<u>Mission</u>

The mission of the Colorado Task Force on Drunk and Impaired Driving (CTFDID) is to support the prevention, awareness, enforcement, and treatment of drunk and impaired driving in Colorado through strong partnerships with public, private, and non-profit organizations.

The CTFDID brings people together, creating a forum for victims and advocates to access many experts and resources in one place. It provides a formal mechanism to leverage resources in order to create a multi-faceted approach to solving a problem, which is often minimized and understated in our community. The CTFDID acts as a resource for the legislature, enabling it to consider more cohesive, well-thought-out proposals.

NHTSA (National Highway Traffic Safety Administration) Region 8 Update:

- Tuesday Black, CDOT
 - Task force is moving forward with hiring TURF to conduct a full state evaluation of impaired driving programs
 - Contacts from various agencies will be identified within the next month
 - TURF representatives may contact agency contacts for interviews and data collection

- Evaluation is funded through separate sources (not NHTSA)
- Expected completion: Fall 2025
- This will be more comprehensive than the previous evaluation conducted by Highway Safety Office and NHTSA in January

Statistics, State Fatality Numbers:

- Tuesday Black, CDOT
 - As of March 13th, 166 fatalities statewide compared to last year 206. Decline
 - Combination of efforts, thank you!
 - Reagan Chiaverini, CDPHE
 - Motor Vehicle Fatalities to date as of May 11, fatal crashes 157,
 - o 89 daytime 68 nighttime, 10pm-3am highest impairment,
 - Fatalities by Vehicle Type:
 - Occupant vehicles: 27% suspected impaired (at-fault driver)
 - Motorcycles: 19 fatalities
 - Pedestrians: 34 fatalities
 - Bicyclists: 3 fatalities
 - Other vehicles: 7 fatalities
 - Highest number of at-fault drivers: 25-44 age range
 - Highest impairment percentage: Ages 21-24 (9 of 15 crashes suspected impaired)
 - Ages 25-34: 17 of 31 crashes suspected impaired
 - Time Analysis:
 - Daytime crashes: 89 total, 19% suspected impaired
 - Nighttime crashes: 68 total, 47% suspected impaired
 - Peak impairment hours: 2:00-5:00 AM
 - Peak crash hours: 8:00-9:00 PM
 - County Data:
 - Highest fatalities: Weld, Adams, Denver
 - Highest impairment rates: Adams County (56%), Jefferson County (50%)
 - Highest rate per 100,000 population: Pueblo, Weld, Adams
 - Crystal Soderman, DOR
 - o Getting close to finalizing 2024 calendar year results
 - Total Express Consent Stops: 14,669
 - Refusal Rate: 42.11% (down from 42.66% in 2023)
 - 2025 Year-to-Date: Currently showing ~50% refusal rate, but expected to decrease as blood test results are processed
 - Slight improvement in refusal rates
 - Educational efforts showing positive impact
 - Special thanks to Sam Cole for public education campaigns
 - Rachel Reinhardt, CSP
 - o January to April
 - Property 3.2% Decrease
 - Injury 22.6% decrease
 - SBI 19% decrease
 - Fatalities: 16% decrease (25 to 21)
 - Fatal Crash Impairment Rate: Decreased from 37% to 29%
 - Potential correlation between improved vehicle safety technology and increased SBI rates
 - Importance of seatbelt usage in reducing fatalities
 - Current seatbelt usage rate: approximately 88% (up from 86-87% in previous years)

Legislative Updates:

- Tuesday Black, HSO now will be Emily Haddaway, CDOT
 - General Fund Reduction: \$69M this year, \$49.5M next year from SB 21-260 transfers
 - Revitalizing Main Streets Program: \$7M ongoing funding eliminated
 - Road Safety Surcharge: Temporary \$3.70 reduction across all weight classes (\$44M impact)
 - o Bridge/Tunnel Enterprise: \$28M increase over three years through diesel fee
 - Tire Chain/Traction Control: Signed into law, enables CDOT permitting for chain assist vendors
 - Marijuana Impaired Driving Program: Funding reduced from \$950K to \$450K but maintained
- Brandon Nathlich, CSP
 - SB 281-Careless driving resulting in death Bill
 - Extreme Indifference Bill
 - Clarified that each death counts as separate offense
 - Created felony charge for careless driving causing serious bodily injury
 - Multiple pro-law enforcement bills passed
 - Defeated Bills:
 - Traffic stop questioning restrictions
 - Military surplus vehicle registration
 - Extended bar hours (drinking until 3:00 AM

 - Preserved High Visibility Enforcement funding
 - Defeated extended drinking hours legislation
 - Blood Draw Preservation (SB 273): Allows coroners to request hospitals preserve blood draws for 14 days
 - o House Bill 1291: Rideshare safety legislation passed but may be Vetoed by Gov. Polis
 - Extreme Indifference/Assault Bills: Continued discussions planned for interim
 - Federal HALT Implementation: Working on anti-drunk driving technology
 - Proposition 130 Implementation:
 - Law enforcement recruitment/retention funding implemented through creative state retirement fund mechanism
