Opening Statement: Colonel Wolfinbarger, Chief of the Colorado State Patrol

- Hopefully everyone has reviewed the agenda
- We will discuss the annual report
- Sue Igli has moved on and JoAnna Pruitt will step in and fill an interim roll until the position can be filled

JoAnna Pruitt: Introduction of self to task force.

Chief Wolfinbarger: Jennifer Grey gives everyone her very best and thanks everyone for their support. There will be information forthcoming on a fund raiser for her.

No Public Comments.

No Comments on prior minutes.

There was a motion by Abe Hutt to accept the minutes and second by Glenn Davis. Motion passed.

Ray Fisher: Summary of the KPI's

- This document was passed out to everyone
- Proactive enforcement as it related to DUI- there is no crash data on this KPI
 - o Enforcement is down from 11 to 12
 - o We were unable to put together crash data but will have it for the next meeting
 - o Enforcement is down statewide
- Is there anything else that you would like to see in the KPI's? Remember that these are just CSP's stats; we do not have other agency stats.

Chief Wolfinbarger: The 410 funding from the Feds through CDOT is significant

- There may be things like the Pro Challenge and Occupy Denver draining some resources
- It may also be getting harder for Troopers and Officers as people are learning and not driving while intoxicated.

Glenn Davis: We had record arrests over the July 4th enforcement period.

Steve Hooper: DOR's numbers are running a bit higher as well.

Chief Wolfenbarger: I think that is a direct statement that the S.O.'s and P.D.'s are working diligently to continue decreasing DUI fatal crashes.

Chief Ticer: Our numbers are down as well.

Bud Bright: Our numbers are down.

Chief Wolfenbarger: The CSP is at or below the crash rate, and we are experiencing a one percent decrease in fatal crashes.

Davis: Local grant funding is through LEAF and the Frist Time Drunk Driver- We had a lot of money returned due the fires as they did not have the resources to work these events this year.

Christine Flavia: Is my memory correct? Is the State Patrol going to collect data on Marijuana stops?

Chief Wolfenbarger: We have started tracking these numbers and the metric is how many stops have been made in which a medical marijuana card was held.

- CDOT has done some nice work with dispensaries as well as CDPHE.

Fisher: Cindy, can we get some information as to how many blood tests you have processed?

Cindy Burbach: Yes. I just sent that information to the Governor's Office.

Chief Wolfenbarger: Can we have that information as well?

Burbach: Yes. It is already compiled.

Davis: We can provide fatality information as well.

Chief Wolfenbarger: What about ARIDE?

- Most of our troopers and the ranks through Sergeant's are trained in ARIDE and the DRE's are saying that their rates have increased.

Laura Sonderup: We work closely with CDOT and our focus is on Multi Cultural Outreach Programs

- Hispanic outreach- there are posters on the tables- especially if you live in a mountain community please stop by and take some
- Showing poster- Translates that it says "Have a good time but don't overdo it"
 - o One beer is a party, two beers is a better party, three beers- call your cousin
 - o Be smart about what a good time looks like
- These are being disseminated in the metro area especially in Adams County.
- Bronco's en Español event included the 21-34 year old Hispanic male community- they were the targeted audience.
 - o We spoke with them and then passed out t-shirts (mobile billboards)
- Trooper Lewis has been a great asset and has been traveling with us quite a bit lately
 - o The enforcement perspective is great- we have gotten a couple of radio spots out of Trooper Lewis as well

Flavia: Is this statewide?

Sonderup: We have primarily worked in the Denver Metro area this year, but in 2013 there is an emphasis on going statewide.

Flavia: How do I get hold of you for posters?

Chief Wolfenbarger: This does really help get the message out to our Latino communities.

- We have really built on our partnership with the Broncos and supporting this program

Fisher: We are also working at the Rapid's games in the Adams County area.

Chief Wolfenbarger: Let's get some updates on the workforce groups.

Bobby Juchem: We went over this in the past, but I am passing some information out.

- TLRC 5 Nano gram bill (Bill D)
- Everything is split into three categories
 - o Alcohol
 - o Traffic
 - o Other
 - Please see hand out for information

Michael Elliott: I testified against the bill last week

- 2011, 2012, and special session 2012 – the bill has been killed
- People are going to get convicted of driving impaired when in actuality they aren't.
- The CCJJ Marijuana Workgroup has been working on this
- I want to find a million dollars for public education and training DRE's
- I think we can come up with solutions to get 100% of the Legislatures on board
 - o We don't know what will happen in November, but I see a long drawn out battle

Chief Wolfenbarger: I think we will cap this discussion at this time. I believe we need to narrow the discussion to how medical marijuana is affecting our roadways. There are various sides of this and at the end of the day I would like to see us focus on safety, education, etc.

Dave Timken: We can move on.

Ticer: What happened to the rest of the bill that included other illicit drugs?

Hooper: We would be remiss if we did not come up with a statement that discussed our stand and position on this issue and what it does for an impaired driving bill.

Chief Wolfenbarger: I believe the premise of the CSP standpoint is in the safety, enforcement, and administration of this bill.

- Trying to come to a standard where we feel it should be is slippery and unrealistic for a task force to handle.

Hooper: Perhaps we should look at the wording in last year's annual report and tweak it and have the task force approve it.

Chief Wolfenbarger: I agree. We can discuss this.

Christine Adams CCJJ: Has a separate task force. CCJJ does not have anything on the table to standardize anything at this time.

Chief Wolfenbarger: We will send out the wording and have everyone review it and discuss it at the meeting in October.

Chief Wolfenbarger: Let's get a motion to develop a draft mission statement for inclusion in our annual report

- We will strip out the actual levels and work on making a statement on general safety and education
- We will work on drafting it out of our office

Motion passed.

Flavia: Persistent Drunk Driver Committee

- Glen, Steve, and Dr. Timpken are members of the committee.
- Truth Fairy Campaign is a social norms campaign.
 - o This committee was originally focused on people that already had an offense and that they not get a second offense.
 - o We are now focusing on not having a first offense.
 - The campaign started at Western State University in Gunnison.
 - o This is all data driven and we have rich data in terms of the effectiveness of this campaign.
 - Western State is smaller and geographically better situated
- Results of the campaign:
 - o Discuss the goals and objectives of the campaign
 - o The program resonated throughout the community – it did not just stay on the campus
 - There were 11 social norm messages
 - Please see hand out for result highlights
- We are currently in CSU Pueblo and the Truth Fairy did not fit in at that campus, therefore we have a new campaign, - it is a Zombie Campaign.
- Evenzombiesknow.com
 - o Will be fully functioning in October.
- Pueblo campaign will have a greater emphasis on marijuana awareness

Hooper: The campus campaign is being focused upon in order to get results data. We are getting good data.

- Won the "Silver award" for the Truth Fairy Campaign
- Won the "Gold award" as well.
- These awards will be like the Stanley Cup.
- The DOR now has a "Speak Now Colorado" website.
 - o Speaknowcolorado.org
 - Is a resource for parents to talk with their kids about impaired driving

Chief Wolfenbarger: These are great resources and campaigns, and the Truth Fairy is one of the best campaigns that I have seen.

- What was the amount of money spent?

Flavia: I don't know off the top of my head. It's all PDD funding and comes from offender fines.

Chief Wolfenbarger: We need to refocus in our work groups. Issues like PDD and reduction to .15.

Fisher: We are required to complete our annual report and turn it into the judiciary committee in January.

- Please review the handout with the Annual Report Development Schedule.
 - o October 19, 2012 Annual report draft narratives the e to IFTDD staff.
 - Please include photographs, charts, graphs, campaign artwork, etc.

Chief Wolfenbarger: We want to represent the many different cross disciplines that are represented in this Task Force.

- We will send the Leads for the different workgroups a word document that includes last year's information so that it is easier to massage the information in it.
- Bobby is our representative for the Patrol that submits the reports to the judicial committee.

Fisher: We want to be the Task Force that people go to when they need help or have questions on these issues.

Chief Wolfenbarger: October 19, 2012 is our next meeting.

- We want to ensure a quorum for this meeting.

Everything passed with the new Intox 9000 and we are moving forward.

- Rural areas will be covered and there is online training and people going out into the field to help with training as well.

Davis: FY2013 funding is in. We have all of the money in. The funding is now under MAP 21 and not SAFETLU.

- I would like to be able to discuss this at the next meeting.
- There will no longer be 402 and 410 funding.
- This will change how we do business.

Fisher: Can you talk about the Federal level and where it is going.

Davis: There are things that I can discuss at the next meeting. If they are going to be so finite it will be difficult for states to get funding.

Ticer:

- Thanks to MADD
- The IACP has a competition – CSP, Avon PD, and Fort Carson PD are being recognized on a National level for their work in Traffic Safety and educational programs.
- I am representing the state through NHTSA on a seatbelt initiative for states that have secondary seatbelt laws
 - o There is a lesser number of seatbelt usage in DUI crashes and so the two correlate
 - We are working together on this correlation and I will keep you updated.
 - o Let's not forget about the seatbelt message when it comes to Drunk Driving.

Transdermal Alcohol monitoring study from NHTSA is out.

- There are improved jurisdictional and cost effective areas listed
- I will work on disseminating this to everyone.
- The City and County of Denver has done a great job.

Elliott: In general part of the reason why I come to these meetings has been for bridge building.

- The fact that I as a representative from the medical marijuana community can come to these meeting and be a part of these meetings says a lot.
- There are a lot of things that we can do together and we have been working with CDOT on the "Heat is On Campaign".
- Sensible Colorado and the Cannabis Alliance are coming on board as well.
- We have looked at the studies about the effectiveness of the Per se laws, and I'm not saying that there isn't a level that needs to be put in place, but there are other things that we can do to build the trust in this particular community.

Garwood: Stepping down on the task force and replacement is Susan Calling and she will be attending the upcoming meeting with me.

- It has been a privilege to be a part of the group

Steve Wrenn: Thank you for pushing the idea of your troop offices meeting with local DA's and building relationships- in our jurisdiction it has been a positive move.

- We had our annual conference and several people here were involved in that
 - o Steve Hooper presented
- There is a lot of good work that the task force is doing to contribute to our processes.
- Contact your local DA's offices for training

Kris Johnson: I would like to give kudos to the CSP for their courteous service during a DUI checkpoint during the Oktoberfest.

- Today is global beer responsible day
- Anheuser Busch is participating in this.
- Today in Time Square the pledge map will be displayed
- 15 leading criminal justice systems – work group at HQ
- Please review handout.

Flavia: The Lifesavers Conference will be in Denver next April and we will be submitting our request for putting on a workshop. The deadline is October 5, 2012.

Timpken: Just returned from Europe and attended an International Interlock conference

- We are not the only country facing the issues we are – our partnering countries are facing the same issues
- Pilot project in the Netherlands for internet counseling
- A number of the countries require counseling and must show they have one years' worth of normal bio markings

Hooper: We need to discuss the notion of moving DUI prosecution of juveniles to juvenile courts and the expungement of their juvenile records.

Sonderup: Muti-cultural is not just the Hispanic community- if you have any activity with the reservations and Native American Indians please keep this in mind.
